- Lead from where you are.
- Trust your gut.
- Use your expertise.
- To quote Brian Woodland, APR, "The art of being wise is to know what to overlook: Not my circus. Not my monkeys."
- Be the conscience of your district.
- Always act in the best interest of children.
- Ask: How does this serve kids?
- Stand for something: equity, inclusion...
- Be a trusted advisor.
- Never take a problem to your boss without offering a solution (or two).
- Never surprise your boss or your board.
- Have your supervisor's/colleague's back.
- Communicate internally, first—ALWAYS.
- Think in the collective tense: "We" not "I."
- Be flexible.
- Offer to do things no one else wants to do.
- Be the role model for how others should act.
- Abide by decisions that are made.
- Ask the hard questions...in private, with grace.
- Always tell the truth.
- Be proactive and transparent in district communication.
- Listen, listen and develop methods for feedback.
- Remember you're on the job 24/7/365.

- Seek to be part of the proactive discussion—rather than just the postdisaster clean-up. Keep knocking on your supervisor's door until you're included.
- NEVER say "I told you so."
