McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Act

Under the federal McKinney-Vento Act, you are considered homeless if you are living:

- In a shelter, motel, vehicle, or campground.
- On the street, in abandoned buildings or trailers.
- Doubled-up with relatives or friends because you don't have a home of your own.

Your children have the right to:

- Attend school.
- Stay in their school even if you must move.
- Immediately enroll in a new school without waiting for proof of residency, immunization, school records or other papers.
- Transportation to school, if feasible.
- Attend preschool programs if offered.
- All the school services they are entitled to receive.
- An advocate.
